LONG RETROSPECT OF A NEGRO. Iowa Colored Man Sufficiently Old to Recall Death of Washington.

MASON CITY, Ia., Nov. 5 .- (Special.)-

The recent death of Jesse Bracken in this city at the age of 100 years and five months recalls the fact that there is living in the city at the present time a man who has reached the advanced age of 111 years. This is Henry Boone, a colored man, who is making his bome with his daughter, Mrs. L. W. Tyler, on Water street. Mr. Boone was born in slavery in the state of Virginia June 7, 1788, on the plantation of a rich Virginia planter named Sandals. He was a slave for seventy-two years and was never sold from the family of his original master. When his first master died he went to Arkansas with Mrs. Blunt, his master's daughter, and remained there until he was liberated by General Curtis, by whom he was brought to the north. Mr. Boone is in remarkably good health and bodily vigor and works around the house con tinually. He retains his memory splendidly and can remember distinctly the news of the death of George Washington, as he was

GEAR-CUMMINS FIGHT CAUSES ANOMALY

Strife of Two Candidates for Senatorial Honors Gives Entire Representation to Smaller of Two Counties.

SIOUX CITY, Ia., Nov. 5 .- (Special.)-The strife between the Gear and Cummins factions in the Monona-Ida legislative district, in the attempt of the candidates for the United States senate to secure this district favorable to their candidacy, has resulted in a condition of things highly unsatisfactory to the people of Monona county, irrespective of political belief, by reason of the fact that both republican and democratic candidates have been chosen from Ida

Under the last apportionment of the legislative districts by the legislature, Ida county was attached to Monona, as is alleged by the populistic and democratic parties in Monona county, for the purpose of securing a republican legislator from this district. Monona county for many years has been the hotbed of populism and the populists have controlled the county by quite large ma-jorities, though in late years it has been gradually decreased. Ida county, on the other hand, has frequently given a republican majority and it is claimed that it was attached to Monona county for the purpose of overcoming the populistic majority, if posand clerks shall see that no ballot is in sible, rather than in compliance with constitutional requirements, popularly supposed to govern in such matters. Election after election has come and gone and populiet candidates have been elected from Monona

Mononn Feels Slighted.

Aside from the matter of politics t is claimed, justly or unjustly, that the legislator should come from that county, inasmuch as under the apportionment Monona would be entitled to a representative of its own, if the same rule was applied to it, as is applied to other counties with like population. Ida county at the time of the passage of the last apportionment act only had a population of 11,000, and now, owing to the fact that both the leading political parties have chosen their candidates from Ida county, it furnishes an example of the tall wagging the dog to such an extent that it is highly unsatisfactory to the people of Monona county. Under these circumstances, the candidacy

of Nathan Lindsey, middle-of-the-road populist, for the legislature in Monona county has developed unexpected strength. The fight which is now in progress has been largely stripped of its political character by reason of the fact that many of the leading politicians of the county, irrespective of party, have identified themselves with his candidacy and it is now conceded by those who have kept themselves in touch with the political situation in this district that he will poll a vote largely in excess of that usually given to candidates of his party.

To men who have batter-WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 .- President Mc-Kinley has issued the following order: EXECUTIVE MANSION, WASHING-EXECUTIVE MANSION, WASHING-TON, Nov. 4, 1899.—In furtherance of inter-changes between thore absent in the serv-ice of their country and their families at home, it is hereby ordered that packages and parcels of mail, also matter taking only articles designed as gifts or souvenirs, and so marked, and with no commercial purpose and not for sale, from officers, soldiers and saliors serving in the army and navy and from persons employed in the civil service of the United States in Porto Rico, Guam, the Philippine islands and Cuba, addressed to members of their families in the United States, or packages of the same personal to members of their families in the United States, or packages of the same personal character addressed from the United States to officers, soldiers, sallors and others in the public service in said islands, may be sent through the mails, subject only to the domestic postal regulations of the United States. 


