STATE EMPLOYEES PAY BILLS

Men Working on Small Salaries Furnish Money for Special Trains.

MUST PUT UP OR LOSE THEIR POSITIONS

Populist State Central Committee is Spending More Money in Nebraska Campaign Than Ever Before—Bright Republican Outlook.

LINCOLN, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—Since the present campaign opened there has been considerable speculation as to the probable amount of revenue of the populist state central committee. It is generally known that more money has been spent in Nebraska by the populists this year than in any previous campaign, but it is not generally known where the money came from.

As soon as the populist state central committee was organized plans were perfected and successfully executed to raise the money necessary to carry on the campaign. All poplarite employees of the state house were called together in the office of the Board of Transportation in the state house early in September and Chairman J. H. Edminster told them what they might expect.

The meeting held in the board of transportation office was behind closed doors and during the regular office hours and no one not connected with the state administration applied at the door for admittance, but were shoved away and the door slammed in their faces.

A special assessment was levied for the expense of the Bryan special train when it was first started on the trip over the state, and the populist party has been unable to raise enough money in this way to defray the entire expense and the plan was given up.

Annual Report of Treasurer Shows a Notable Activity in All Kinds of Currency.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Hon. Ellis H. Roberts, the treasurer of the United States, in his annual report to Secretary Gage sums up the operations of the last fiscal year by saying:

"A notable activity was exhibited in all kinds of currency, with a marked increase in the use of gold coin and in a less degree in silver coin, while the prosperity of the country has at no time left any part of the government notice in the treasury about the demands of daily business in its several offices."

FAMINE ON ISLAND OF GUAM

Military Colony Pleads with Transport to Leave Supplies.

STORES OF STAPLES WHOLLY EXHAUSTED

Native and Foreigners Alike Are in Actual Need of Flour and Potatoes, Which Are Unavailable to Supply.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., Nov. 5.—(Special Telegram.)—The transport Ohio, which arrived this morning from Manila, brings startling news of shortage of food in Guam, among the natives and foreigners. The Ohio reached Guam on September 15. Parker R. Hedgoc went ashore and was literally besieged by members of the military colony, foreigners and natives, who pleaded with him to leave sufficient flour, potatoes and other food necessities sent care from the Ohio to last until relief could be sent by the government.

I was offered almost fabulous sums for flour, potatoes or onions, said Purser Hedgoc today. "The people had had no potatoes nor onions for six months and flour was utterly exhausted. Nobly wanted money, but begged for food. There is still considerable flour on the island, but I understand that need for relief is most pressing."

I went back to the Ohio, thinking to send ashore some flour, which I thought was among the stores, but I found it had been given to Filipinos at Manila. Owing to our shortage of provisions on the Ohio we were unable to leave anything at Guam. The plight of the people there certainly demands immediate attention."

W. O. Wright, lieutenant of Nevada cavalry, and lieutenant quartermaster of transport and the captain of the Ohio fully corroborated the statement of Purser Hedgoc.
