

NEBRASKA'S FUSION LEADER

Political Analysis of the Strength of the New Popocratic Party.

LONG-RANGE VIEW OF THE CAMPAIGN

Molcomb's Strength Pronounced a Great Factor in Bringing About the Fusion Victory—His Political Career.

The Washington correspondent of the New York Evening Post, in a letter to Nebraska, reviews the recent campaign in Nebraska as follows:

An element in the triumph of the fusionists of Nebraska this year which has been ignored in most of the political analyses is the strength of the fusion nominee for judge of the supreme court, Silas A. Holcomb. Fusion in that state was born with his candidacy for governor in 1894, and it has had its most remarkable victories under his leadership. He has always been able to poll the entire vote, and the campaign of 1896 showed that he was more powerful in Nebraska than in any other state. Although opposition to a strenuous effort has always appeared in convention it seems to have little figure at the ballot box.

As he ran conspicuous of the democratic wreck of 1894, the only non-republican governor elected in any northern state except California, so he rises conspicuous this year among the Bryanite contraries.

Contrary to the custom in most states the district judges in Nebraska is a stepping stone to higher political things. Senator Allen was a district judge when elected to the senate, and returned to the same bench after his term expired, taking the place of his democratic partner who resigned his seat on the bench to enter congress.

Political History. Two years later he was nominated by the populist state convention for judge of the supreme court, a position to which he has just been elected.
