SEEKING UNCLE SAM'S JOBS

Candidates for Positions in Census Bureau at Washington Examined.

The ball room on the fourth floor of the Millard hotel has all the appearances of a well-conducted study room in an up-to-date college.

The school at the Millard hotel is conducted by Chief Census Examiner John H. Garber and Assistant Examiner S. R. Parker of Washington.

These officials are from the Census bureau and are holding examinations of applicants who desire positions in the department offices to assist in tabulating the census which will be taken next year.

The applicants who are examined here come from Nebraska, South Dakota, Iowa and Iowa. They are examined in English history and that part of arithmetical work that pertains to census work.

In this branch the examination is chiefly in addition and percentage. The classes run from fifteen to thirty daily and will continue until next Wednesday, when Mr. Garber and his assistant will leave for Topeka, where they will hold an examination for Kansas and the southwest territories. After that they will go to St. Louis and then to New Orleans.

There are from 3,500 to 4,000 positions to give out in the census department and all the positions are to be filled from lists of those who have taken and passed the service examination. The salaries range from \$750 to \$1,200 per year, with a chance for promotion. In selecting parties for these clerkships politics will not enter into consideration, as in no place on the examination papers are the applicants for positions questioned relative to their party affiliations.

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS TO DEBATE

Twelve Contestants Strive for Honor of Representing Omaha Before the State League.

A debating society known as the Demosthenian has been recently organized at the High School, open to undergraduates irrespective of class standing. There are now about thirty members on the rolls and considerable progress has already been made. Just now there is an exciting contest under way as to the choice of debaters to appear in the interschool debate which will occur at Lincoln on December 26, during the meeting of the State Teachers' association.

The debate will be under the auspices of the State Debating League, which has made its forensics contests an annual feature at the State Teachers' association during the last two years.

The contest will take place at the auditorium of the Lincoln High school and the following high schools will participate: Lincoln, Beatrice, Crete, York, Nebraska City and Omaha. The question for discussion this year will be, Resolved, That England is justified in its course toward the Boers.

Omaha, Nebraska City and York, sending two speakers each, will uphold the negative. The contestants will be chosen at preliminary debates held at the various schools interested. The local high school will settle the contest on Friday afternoon, when the judges will rule on the merits of twelve candidates.

The Demosthenians feel that they possess an advantage over their rivals for the reason that the question to be discussed in Omaha is just what they themselves suggested to the state league several months ago, a privilege not shared by the other contesting high schools. The local debaters have given the theme careful study, particularly from the viewpoint to which they have been assigned.
