

WAS SANCTIONED BY KICKERS

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DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN FUND

County Committee Certifies to Its Receipts and Disbursements.

COUNTY OFFICE EMPLOYEES PAY ROUNDLY

Funds Provided by County Employees Are Separately Reported Under the Innocent Head of Contributions.

W. W. McCombs, treasurer of the democratic county central committee, has filed his statement of the finances of the committee, showing the expenditure of \$1,662.05.

The assessment list shows that the following sums were collected: Peter Hofeldt, commissioner, \$100; G. F. Eisasser, treasurer, \$150; Frank Broadwell, clerk of the district court, \$275; H. L. Drake, superintendent of schools, \$60; E. T. Younker, surveyor, \$25; John Power, sheriff, \$200; C. E. Forbes, commissioner of the board of health, \$10; John Zaleski, Robert Williams, Thomas Harrington, Ralph Hall and William Broderick, for assessors, and Robert King, A. R. Harvey and E. A. Shaw, for justices of the peace, \$5 each.

This fund was expended as follows: For polling wards in the city, \$1,000; Joseph King, \$10; P. Bayl, \$5; Joseph Kus, \$10; J. P. Butler, \$24; Patrick Desmond, \$34; Michael P. Butler, \$34; Frank Murphy, \$44; J. E. Donabue, \$36; Hobart Williams, \$12; Joseph Nachtsabel, \$10; William Herald, \$12; Charles Hauba, \$5.

For salary of W. H. Gussulso, secretary of committee, \$15; that of William Shields, clerk of committee, \$50. For rent of halls, \$120.50; rent of headquarters, \$38; printing, \$123.25; postage bills, \$8; carriage hire, \$17; books, \$2.85; Joseph Buila and E. Conley, registration in South Omaha, \$18; express, \$1.50.

The contributions came almost entirely from county officers and their subordinates, as follows: George W. Shields, county attorney, \$75; J. H. Grosman, deputy attorney, \$38; E. E. Thomas, deputy county attorney, \$28; Leo Helmer, deputy county auditor, \$40.50; W. R. O'Shaughnessy, clerk for auditor, \$27; W. H. Olmstead, superintendent of county hospital, \$50; C. L. Ruettin, engineer at county hospital, \$38; W. H. Gussulso, messenger for county attorney, \$27; Steve Wagner, George McArdle, \$45; J. P. Kearney, \$45; George Olin and A. A. Gary, employees at county hospital, \$15 each; Ed. J. Dee, superintendent of court house, \$25; Philip Wagner, Henry Beal and Frank Hynek, janitors at court house, \$15 each; Thomas Hoctor, county commissioner, \$54; E. J. Wearna, county physician, \$12; state central committee, \$125; county central committee, \$26; E. E. Howell, \$10; J. G. Megreath, \$10.

Of this fund \$42 was expended for postage, \$2.80 for books, 75 cents for janitor, \$22 for music, \$25 to Patrick Mostyn for live work, \$12.50 to the county printer, \$10 for incidental office expenses, \$35 to W. W. McCombs for expenses, amounts as follows for workers on election day at the respective polls: First ward, \$40; Second ward, \$15; Third ward, \$50; Fourth ward, \$30; Fifth ward, \$35; Sixth ward, \$30; Seventh ward, \$20; Eighth ward, \$10; Ninth ward, \$30; South Omaha, \$70; Chicago precinct, \$10; Clontarf, \$5; Douglas, \$5; East Omaha, Elk-born, Florence, Jefferson, Union and Platte Valley, \$10 each; Millard and McArdle, \$10 each, and West Omaha, \$20.

C. C. Wright, judge of the district court, shows that he did not allow the central committee to tap him at all, but he spent \$110 for his private car, \$100 for the Bur-tonian and \$21.75 for railroad fare, hotel bills and printing.

James P. English got into it for \$120, of which \$50 was assessment by someone unknown, as the report of the democratic committee does not show. He also sent \$30 to the Royal Woodman, \$10 on the Bur-tonian, \$5 on postage and the rest went for carriage hire, car fare, printing and hotel bills.

The candidacy of E. G. McGilton for regent of the university did not stand him in a red cent.

D. M. Haverly for county clerk liquidated to the extent of \$263, of which \$175 went to the campaign committee, \$28.50 to the South Omaha Sun, \$4 to the Royal Woodman, \$10 to the Western Laborer, \$5 each to the Enterprise and Progress, \$8.50 to the Excelsior and the rest for printing and distribution of cards, postage and livery hire.

It cost Thomas Harrington \$8 to run for assessor, of which \$5 went to the central committee, \$2.50 to cards and "time lost in coming up to the court house to file this statement, 50 cents." To make the race for justice of the peace Louis V. Gage squandered \$18.50, all for printing and distribution of cards. Arthur E. Baldwin for the same office laid out \$8.75, of which \$5 went to the Royal Woodman, Adam Stenger, running for justice of the peace, reported, "I have had no expense whatever in my printing." P. P. Mergen spent \$7.75 for election, Paul Sommer \$10, of which \$10 was assessment, and H. Williams \$10, of which half was assessment, to run for assessor.

Henry F. Bremer, for the Board of Education, put \$19 into his bundle, of which \$5 went to getting voters to register, \$2 to the Royal Woodman and the rest for cards.

The following report expenditure of nothing: Chris P. Soff and William Cohrs, overseers, and John S. Kelly and J. P. Boyer, constables; Henry Peters, assessor Chicago precinct; C. B. Nichols, assessor Waterloo; Herman Tangeman, overseer Clontarf; Marcus Roos, assessor Clontarf, and W. W. Wilde, justice Clontarf.

John J. Daly hired \$2 into his contest for constable in South Omaha.

FIGHTING OVER THE SPOILS

Fusion Managers Have Difficulty in Satisfying All the Claims.

DEMOCRATS MUST GIVE WAY TO CONVERTS

Appointment of Appointive Offices Between Parties and Within the Ranks Excites Turmoil and Contentions.

The partial victory won by the fusionists in Douglas county has culminated in a mad scramble for the loaves and fishes, and promises made before election have fallen to a low discount.

For example, Pat Ford, the democratic wheelhorse of the Third ward, was assured of the position of county jailer and on the strength of the assurance worked night and day for power, but Ford's laurels are to be snatched from him and given to a populist, James B. Jones, president of the Peter Cooper club.

Another deal said to have been closed is the appointment of Charles Pospisil, another populist, who has the support of the machine, as one of the sheriff's deputies.
