WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The annual report of the secretary of the navy, just made public, is a document of unusual interest, dealing not only with the work of the department during the last year and important recommendations for the future, but also discussing the more important questions relating to the navy, including the authorization of eighteen new war ships, the imperative need of special legislation to the reorganization of the navy, and the proposition that the thanks of congress be given to the commander in chief of the North Atlantic squadron and to the officers and men under his command, particularly those who took part in the naval operations of the war.
