Congressman Gamble is preparing a bill so amending the law relating to the disposition of timber on forest reserves as to discontinue the delays caused in securing permission to remove timber from the reserves for building and fuel purposes. The bill proposes to reduce the time of notice from sixty days to thirty days and gives the land commissioner direction to permit of the removal of small amounts of timber for the purposes named without thirty days' notice.

Rice and coffee, sugar and cocoanuts, hemp and tobacco and many products of the temperate as well as trople zone, grow in various rections of the archipelago. I have seen hundreds of bushels of Indian corn lying in a rond fringed with banana trees. The forests of Negros, Mindanao, Mindora, Paluan and parts of Luzon are invaluable and intact. The wood of the Philippines can supply the furniture of the world for a century to come. I have a nugget of pure gold picked up in its present form on the banks of a Philippine creek. I have gold dust washed out by crude processes of careless matives from the sands of a Philippine stream. Both indicate great deposits at the source from which they come, in one of the islands great deposits of copper exist unlouched. The mineral wealth of this empire of the ocean will one day surprise the world.

It will be hard for Americans who have not studied them to understand the becole. My own belief is that there are not 190 men among them who comprehend what Anglo-Saxon self-government even means, and there are over 5,000,000 people to be governed. I know many clever and highly educated men among them, but there are only three commanding intellects and characters—Arellano, Mashini and Aguinaido. Arellano, the chief justice of our supreme court, is a profound lawyer and a brave and incorruptible man. Mabini is the highest type of subilety and the most constructive mind that race has yet produced. Aguinaido is a clever popular leader, able, brave, resourceful, cunning ambitious, unscripulous and masterful. He is full of decision, initiative and authority and had the confidence of the masses.
