

Immense Losses from Floods. Immense Losses from Floods. TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 23.—Official reports just completed give details of terrible in-undations which destroyed property valued at over 6,000,000 yen in Hokkaido province, northern Japan in December. Thirty-five towns in the district of Ishikari were de-vastated. Since September no less than 17.288 houses have been submerged or washed away in Hakkaido alone, while the total damage is placed at 13.000,000 yen. Complete returns show that about 100 fishing schooners and other craft were de-stroyed or sunk during the severe storm which swept over the Japanese coast De-cember 23 to 25. The total number of lives lost is placed at 139.
