GIVES VERDICT OF SUICIDE

Coroner's Jury Declares That Charles B. Jones Killed Himself.

BERTHA ALEXANDER FULLY EXONERATED

Postmaster Gives Testimony That Solved the Mystery of the Death—No Cause Known for the Deed.

While the motive is still lacking, later developments tend to show that Charles B. Jones, the colored janitor who was found dead in the room at the Postmaster's office, committed suicide and the coroner's jury brought in a verdict to that effect yesterday afternoon. The finding of the jury exonerated the negro, Bertha Alexander, and at the termination of the inquest she was given her freedom.

Violent Death of Man Who Claimed to Be 108 Years Old.

John Montgomery who claimed to be 108 years of age and who had been a well known character in Council Bluffs for many years, was run down and instantly killed yesterday morning by a freight train in the yards of the Milwaukee railway, between Eighth and Ninth streets. His body was horribly mangled, his head being crushed into a shapeless mass and the brains scattered over the rails and ties.

Montgomery's Death of Man Who Claimed to Be 108 Years Old.

Montgomery was walking along the main track when the accident happened. In addition to being deaf, his head was wrapped up to protect him from the cold. He did not hear the freight train, which was backing down in the same direction as he was walking. The shouts of the engine were heard from far before the train could be brought to a standstill and his lifeless body extricated from beneath the wheels.

Compromised Physician's Testimony.

Dr. A. W. Stevenson, the county physician, who was summoned a few minutes after the tragedy had taken place. He testified as to finding the body, the location of the revolver on the bed and the statement made at the time by the woman, Bertha Alexander. He also testified as to the holding of the autopsy and described the nature of the wound in the head.

Officer Callaghan, who was on the Broadway woman, testified to seeing the Alexander woman rush out of the building and on learning from her that Jones had shot himself, she had hastened to the morgue, where she identified the body as that of Charles B. Jones.

Bertha Alexander's Story.

Then Bertha Alexander was placed on the stand and she repeated practically the same story as she told Monday evening. She said that about 4:30 o'clock Jones came to the house and got on her the key to their room. When she returned home about 5 o'clock Jones was sitting in the back room. She did not speak to him and he went into the front room and, partly undressing himself, lay down in the bed. He called to her and she asked him what he wanted. He asked her to write him some writing for him and she asked him why he could not do his own writing, as he always did. At his request she wrote the note to Phil Betz, the head janitor at the federal building, and then he told her to address an envelope to his brother, Dennis, Jones, at Leavenworth, Kan. She had written the name on the envelope when she heard the shot. She jumped off the bed and without waiting to see if Jones was wounded rushed down the stairs into the street. She went to a saloon opposite and asked for a policeman, saying Jones had shot himself. She was told there was no policeman there and from there she went to the Eagle laundry, where the clerk telephoned to the police station. She denied that there had been any quarrel between Jones and herself and that since her return from Sioux City, three or four months ago, they had lived peaceably together. She admitted that before she went to Sioux City there had been trouble between them. Her story was told in a straightforward manner and on cross-examination she adhered to her original statement.

Postmaster Treynor Testifies.

Postmaster Treynor testified that Jones was employed as assistant janitor at the postoffice and as such had access to all parts of the building at all times. He said the revolver was his and that he kept it in the top drawer on the right-hand side of his desk in his private office. He had not noticed it was missing until he was shown the weapon by the coroner. It must have been taken Monday morning some time after 10 o'clock. He said he never knew Jones to be dependent, as he was always of a happy disposition whether he had a dollar or an ink in his pockets. Jones had appeared to be worried about a year ago over his trouble with the Alexander woman, but that, he thought, had all passed off. While Jones, as far as he knew, was not a steady heavy drinker, he had seen him on two occasions much the worse for drink. Mr. Treynor said Jones received his pay check Monday morning, amounting to \$16 and a few cents. Inquiry showed that he had paid out of this sum about \$26 which he had borrowed in the office. He had also paid a saloon bill and some other few accounts, so that when Jones went to Omaha Monday he could not have had much over \$10 or \$12 with him.

Deliberate Suicide.

Further evidence came to light last evening after the inquest showing undoubtedly that Jones deliberately committed suicide. Coroner Treynor, in turning over the effects of the dead man to the brother from Leavenworth, discovered two letters which Jones had written, both being addressed to his brother. These letters were found underneath some papers on a little table in the back room where Jones was sitting when Bertha Alexander returned home Monday evening. Neither of the two letters were signed or dated, but the handwriting was

Only Practitioners of the Old School Will Be Allowed to Serve as Superintendents of Hospitals for the Insane.

DES MOINES, Feb. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—After a warm fight in the house the Prentiss bill to provide that all superintendents of hospitals for the insane do not be appointed from the same school of medicine was defeated by a vote of 37 to 52. Hawk, Eiker, Townsend and Overhill, all physicians of the old school, fought the bill on the ground that it approached class legislation by discriminating against a certain school, Prentiss and his followers held it was but justice to provide for the representation of a school of medicine equally good and in which so many of the best physicians of the state had faith and that at present the Board of Control could not appoint from other than the established school because of the power of the latter as an organization.
