'He reports by dispatch at 5:35 p. m. that he had forced a passage at Clipdrift and has occupied the hills north of the river, capturing three of the enemy's laagers, with their supplies, while General Gordon of the Fifteenth Hussars, with his brigade, who made a feint at Rondevaldrift, four miles west, has selzed it and a second drift between that and Clipdrift, together with two more laagers.

"General French's performance is brilliant, considering the excessive heat and a blinding duststorm which raged during the latter part of the day. "Owing to the rapidity of his move-

ments General French met with but slight opposition and his losses were small. Lieutenant Johnson of the Inniskillin Dragoons is the only officer reported severely wounded.

"The Sixth division was last night on the north bank of the Riet, at Watervaldrift, and is moving to support the cavairy. The Seventh division is here and will go on this afternoon.

"Four officers and fifty-three men had to be sent last evening in the returning wagons to the railway line, prostrated by heat and exhaustion."
