

POPPELTON'S RECORD AT LAW

Name of Union Candidate for Mayor Hard to Find on Court Dockets.

HE IS BUSY LOOKING AFTER HIS WEALTH

Personal of Files in Office of District Clerk Discloses that Mr. Poppleton is Not a Bunking Member of Omaha Bar.

Advocate of W. S. Poppleton, fusion candidate for mayor, is not trying to attract attention in his profession. Mr. Poppleton has for several years maintained a well appointed law office in the First National bank building, and the surroundings indicate the working habitation of a great disciple of Blackstone.

Personal of the appearance dockets on file in the office of the clerk of the district court, which is a reliable index to the status of the Omaha bar, tells a story somewhat at variance with the impression that is made by the gilded furnishings of young Mr. Poppleton's office.

Beginning in 1890 and running up to the opening of the present year a summary of the appearance dockets does not reveal the name of W. S. Poppleton in a dozen cases. Page after page bears the name of other attorneys—some of them struggling young lawyers, some of them established attorneys, while the names of attorneys are sometimes omitted from the appearance dockets—that is, the records may show who is attorney for one side of a case without a mention of the opposing attorney.

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As nearly as can be obtained from a glance at the appearance dockets, which are without index as to the names of interested attorneys, Mr. Poppleton has within the last ten years appeared only in the following cases:

Mary Burke against August Benzon et al. W. S. Poppleton, guardian of August Benzon and others.

Matter in settlement of estate of petition filed April 29, 1891, settlement effected January 5, 1892.

State of Nebraska on relation of Solon T. Towne against the Board of Education (of which Mr. Poppleton was at that time a member) commenced against the Board of Education by a legal advisor, but not an active pleader. Towne sought to have the Board of Education remove from the High school building the pupils and teachers of more suitable quarters, conducted in the High school building. The hearing came before Judge Irving in 1891. He denied the writ of mandamus.

A. J. Poppleton against Lowe Avenue Building association, dissolved by court order, petition filed January 13, 1894. Order of sale issued December 12, 1895. In this, Mr. Poppleton represented the interests of his father.

A. J. Poppleton against Poppleton Park Building association, dissolved for want of prosecution at cost of plaintiff.

Mercantile Bank of Canada against George Hespeler, attachment; Poppleton attorney for plaintiff. Petition filed May, 1896, and order of sale issued by court in May, 1897.

Helen L. Fowler against Jonathan M. Gardner, A. J. Poppleton et al.; W. S. Poppleton attorney for defendants. This was an equity proceeding for the sale of property. Action was begun June 1, 1896, and sale was confirmed by court March 13, 1897.

Enjoining sidewalk improvements. Caroline L. Poppleton and William S. Poppleton, executors and trustees of the estate of A. J. Poppleton, against the City of Omaha and the Board of Public Works, equity. Action was begun October 23, 1896, and the case was dismissed on application of the defendant March 30, 1897. Costs were thrown upon the plaintiff. There may be something suggestive and apropos to the present mayoral campaign in the fact that this suit was an effort on the part of Mr. Poppleton and the Poppleton estate to evade the cost of placing sidewalks in front of property in Poppleton Park addition. The tenants clamored for a walkway and there was such a popular uprising that the Board of Public Works ordered the walks laid. The interest of the Poppletons was involved to the extent of paying for board walks in front of nine lots. They went into court to get a restraining order, and although defeated the first round, they made a second effort and succeeded in securing a permanent injunction against the proposition to improve that part of the city. The second effort was made some time after the original suit.

Commercial National Bank against W. S. and Caroline Poppleton, executors of the estate of A. J. Poppleton, an equity proceeding in which a sale of property was involved. Order confirming the sale was made May 4, 1898.

Omaha Savings Bank against W. S. and Caroline Poppleton et al. Equity case involving sale of property, begun November 25, 1897, and ended with order of court confirming sale May 15, 1899.

Elizabeth C. Poppleton against Adam Snyder, suit for collection of \$2,170.92; petition filed July 3, 1894, case tried and won by plaintiff January 3, 1898. Snyder had a ten-year lease on a business house belonging to the Poppleton estate, the terms of which required the payment of \$150 per month and the realty taxes on the place during the tenure of the lease. It was alleged by the Poppletons that Snyder failed to meet his payments and he was sued for the delinquency, also for the amount of taxes, which the petitioners set forth were paid by them after it became apparent that Snyder would not discharge the obligation.

As a caption to Mr. Poppleton's legal record he was plaintiff in the injunction proceedings against the mayor and council relative to an injunction against altering the water works contract. He has already told in his speeches during the present campaign that he won the case, or rather that counsel in his employ won it. The final entry in this case was made May 23, 1898. Messrs. Weaver & Giller, a local law firm, represented the prosecution with Mr. Poppleton as plaintiff.
