MARKET REACTS QUICKER THAN IT RISES

Early Trading in Wheat is Marked by Considerable Liquidation-Corn is Dull and Inclined to Weakness with Low Prices.

CHICAGO, March 20 .- A bulge of 50c in the price of May pork, the result of a small among shorts in that article, was the feature of the trading on 'change today. The advance was due to fear of a corner in the short stocks and the market reacted quicker than it had risen when the stuff once began to come on the market. May pork closed 23gc lower; lard and ribs, 6@71sc lower. Wheat was dull, but fairly steady, helped by better foreign demand, and closed lafelic higher. Corn declined lice and oats closed a shade lower. A be'tef was prevalent that all the markets were being manipulated by a clique of scalpers. Early trading in wheat was marked by considerable liquidation. Cables were lower at the opening and continued to decline, which, with the continued large receipts in the northwest and the absence of foreign demand left the market practically without support. May opened unchanged at 664,6665c. Pressure to liquidate, which soon became quite general, forced the price back to 661,c. Below this price, however, the bears could not force the market and shortly before it o clock a good demand sprang up, local shorts and outsiders giving support to the market and advancing the price to 66%c. This demand satisfied the market again relapsed into a condition of heaviness, with the price fluctuating within a narrow range. During the last hour of trading strength again developed. The virible decrease, L328,990 bushels, was more than expected. This suffened the market appreciably, and when the scabbard reported an improved foreign demand buying became quite brisk, the May price reaching the best point of the day, 66%c. The market closed steady at that price. Chicago receipts were \$1 cars. Minneapolis and Dultuh receipts were 76 cars, compared with 932 last week and 381 a year ago. Total primary receipts were 511,000 bushels. The sandard reported 20 londs taken for export, while 170,000 bushels were sold here for shipment. Chicago contract stocks decreased 94,000 bushels for the week.

Provisions were active, the market at times being in a semi-panicky condition, so far as pork was concerned, and the price of that commodity covered a wide range. Small stocks of pork, the continued advance in the price of hogs and fear that a corner might be attempted, brought about a strong buying movement shortly after the opening, and as the price went skyward shorts tumbled over themselves in their eagerness to cover. The price advanced 50c in a very few minutes. Then offers became liberal and the market fell a great deal faster than it had advanced, 30c being clipped off the advance in about two minutes. Later another selling flurry chopped off 30c more, but before the close confidence had been restored and the price had again advanced to about yesteriay's closing figures. Later in the session there was considerable selling pressure put on lard and ribs and those commodities suffered in consequence, pork also weakening somewhat. The close was rather nervous, with May pork 25c lower at \$6.05, and May ribs 50714c lower at \$6.05.

MOVEMENTS OF STOCKS AND BONDS.

Explosive Outbreak Takes Pince in New York Traction Group. NEW YORK, March 20.—There was a briliant display of speculative pyrotechnics in the stock market today, which was interesting and informing as a spectacle, but which must have been attended with very which must have been attended with very unpleasant circumstances for some one. The explosive outbreak took place in the New York traction group and was precipitated by the official annuncement published this morning that the Metropolitan Street Railway had secured a controlling interest in the Third Avenue railroad.

This at once confirmed the fears of the shorts, which have been quite acutely manifested for several days, that there was not a large enough supply of Third Avenue stock on the market to enable them to cover their unfilled contracts for delivery. In bother words, the stock was cornered. The result, briefly stated, was a jump of nearly 17 points in the price on top of yesterday's rise of nearly 19 points. The violent rise in the stock brought out large lots from long holders, which caused many relapses and made wide and feverish fluctuations all day. But when the shorts attempted to supply their needs the price always mounted upward again. The New York public utilities have been the favorite field of operation by the bears for several days past and the sympathetic strength imparted to the group by the Metropolitan. Third Avenue combination drove the shorts to cover with a rush.

The extreme advances in the group were: Metropolitan, 11½: Brooklyn Transit, 7%; Consolidated Gas, 7; Brooklyn Union, 5, and Manhattan, 4½. The possibilities of economy of operation and elimination of destructive rivairies as a result of the combination undoubtedly improve the status of the Metropolitan and Third Avenue properties, but the price movement of the day was almost wholly due to speculative exigencies. Third Avenue stock commanded as high as 4 per cent premium for use on loans. There was furious manipulation in the stock all day, as was evidenced by the simultaneous sales on regular sale commandeing the high price. Other stocks in which the short interest has been prominent largely reflexied the urgent demand from the shorts. unpleasant circumstances for some one.
