The office was crowded all day, it being the first audience granted officeseekers since the mayor's re-

In the treasurer's office the full force was each. busily engaged in closing up the business, and the formal transfer of cash was made during the afternoon, the amount turned over being in the neighborhood of \$375,000. When all the assets of the office were accounted for, ex-Treasurer Edwards, accompanied by a local agent for a bond guaranty company. Comptroller Westberg and Treasurer Hennings visited the different depositories in which city funds were held and drew out the full amount to the credit of the city. Checks were not used in the transaction, the legal tender being in evidence in every case.

"If the state had required the actual money from Treasurer Hill instead of being satisfled with his check for \$236,000 on the broken Capital National bank," remarked the comptroller, "it might have been that much better off." 
