NEW YORK, March 30.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say:

Progress toward better things has been unmistakable. It was a year ago that the financial speculation in industrial stocks reached its culmination, with prices averaging higher than at any time since, while railroad stocks, after some decline, rose 11 1/2 per cent higher in September, and after the fall in bonds, which ended in December, have now risen 34.3 per cent to the highest point of this year. SOUTH OMAHA NEWS.

All three of the republican candidates for member of the Board of Education are making an interesting campaign and in this work they are being ably assisted by the South Omaha School League, which was organized a short time ago for the purpose of bringing about a better government in the public schools.

During the school year of 1898-9 the Board of Education spent \$25,453.50, thus making the average cost per pupil \$21.18. The school year of 1899-1900 shows an enormous increase in expenses. It will require an expenditure of \$100,000 for the present fiscal year under contracts already made.

After looking over these figures an officer of the school league said: "Why such an extraordinary expenditure when the ratio of attendance shows a decrease? The people of South Omaha should see to it that good men are placed on the board to find out why such reckless expenditures are made and correct them."

At Elgin, Ill., the attendance is given as 4,117, and the cost \$29.96. Newport, R. I., has a school population of 3,517, and it costs the city \$25.46 per child. At Stockton, Cal., the average attendance is 2,738, and the cost per pupil \$34.47.
