



HANDLING RAILWAY MAILS

Omaha is the Center of a Large and Important District.

Sixty Are Engaged on the Omaha and Ogden Run-An Average Day's

Work of a Railway Mail

Route Clerk.

On the second floor of the federal building in Omaha is an office which attracts little attention, but whose importance is second to none in all of the governmental departments represented there. It is the office of the Omaha district of the railway mail service, in charge of H. F. Shearer, This office has control of the railway mail service for all the roads operating in Nebraska, except the service of the Burlington, which is under centrol of the office at Lincoln. In the service of the Omaha office are employed 110 railway mail clerks, divided among the roads of the district as follows: Union Pacific, from Omaha to Ogden,

Fremont, Elkhorn & Missouri Valley, from Missouri Valley, la., to Deadwood, S. D., fourteen.

Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha from Omaha to Sioux City, six. Missouri Pacific, from Omaha to Ogden,

Branch lines of the various roads in the district, twenty-nine. The Omaha office was established in 1869, Captain White, now superintendent of the lepartment, being the first clerk in charge. This office was filled by an inspector at that time, which was the official designation of Captain White. He was here but a few months when the title of the officer in charge was changed, and D. B. Ball was placed in charge at Omaha. At that time only three

In the afternoon the clerks go to the transfer station in Council Bluffs where the mail for all points along the Union Pacific and connecting lines is left by

the trains from the east. The sacks are marked to show which contains the mail for the nearest stations and these are first distributed. The mail clerks in the Omaha district have to "work," or distribute all mail received by South Dakota, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Utah and Oregon. At the Council Bluffs office the clerk will find mail for towns in all of the state west of Nebraska. He is required to know the connecting points of all mail routes with his road, the star routes as well as those over railroad lines. This is no small matter, as may be seen when it is known that some

Distributing 1,573 cards at the rate of seventy per minute the clerk made one error. Another clerk in "working" the state of Missouri, in distributing 2,886 cards, representing postoffices on 182 distinct routes, at the rate of 21.6 per minute, made four errors and secured a grade of 99.86 per cent. The increase in the rank and pay of clerks depends in a great measure upon the result of the records made at these examinations, but the route will often set aside the result of a poor examination. A constant check is kept upon the work of each carrier. When he ties and routes a package of letters it must be so marked that the clerk routing it can be ascertained. If the letter is placed in wrong pouch a note of the fact is sent to the office, where it acts as a demerit mark
