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THERE'S MILLIONS IN IT

Commercial Club Takes Up Question of Western Irrigation in Eastern.

URGES CONGRESSIONAL APPROPRIATION

Will inaugurate a Campaign Looking to the Acquisition of Millions of Acres of Government Lands Tributary to Omaha.

At the regular meeting of the executive committee of the Commercial club resolutions were adopted committing the club to the inauguration of a campaign for the acquisition of a project for the irrigation of 100,000,000 acres of western arid lands now owned by the government.

The construction by the federal government of storage reservoirs and irrigation works wherever necessary to furnish settlement of the arid public lands.

The preservation of the forests and reforestation of denuded forest areas as sources of water supply, the conservation of existing supplies by approved methods of irrigation and distribution and the increase of the water resources of the arid region by such irrigation and development of underground supplies.

The public grazing lands which are unsuitable for agriculture to be leased at a nominal rental in limited areas to settlers farming adjacent lands, the revenue from such government land being used for irrigation in the states or territories, wherein the lands are situated, leases to be subject to right of reclamation by irrigation and settlement of lands actually reclaimed or cultivated, title of land to remain in federal government until actually reclaimed.

Resolved: That we urge upon congress that an appropriation of not less than \$20,000 should be made in this session for irrigation surveys and maps of irrigable public lands with plans and estimates of cost of reservoirs, canals and irrigation works necessary for their reclamation and for sinking experimental artesian wells.

Co-Operation of Commercial Bodies. The resolutions provide further that copies of the resolutions be sent to each senator and congressman from this state, that they be urged to support the appropriation and secure the enactment of any law relating to public lands not in harmony with the policy above set forth. They also provide for the taking of steps to secure similar cooperation of every commercial organization of the country and induce them to secure support of their legislatures and congressmen for the measure.

Mr. Maxwell spoke with telling effect of the great impetus that the adoption of such a policy would bring to the development of the west, declaring that under it Omaha would double its population every five years until the population of the west equals that of the east. The improvement of the lands would enable the government to dispose of them at enhanced prices that would more than repay for the improvements and thus a revolving fund could be produced to continue indefinitely as long as arid lands remain to be reclaimed.

Provision was made for the appointment of a permanent committee to carry on this work, and Mr. Maxwell will remain in the city a day or two to get the work well started.

The committee refused to take action on the proposed repeal of the bicycle lamp ordinance, although it was stated that a revision of the council had requested that it do so. Although every member present appeared to favor the continuance of the measure it was not deemed advisable to mix in this fight.
