CONVENTION HALL CONTRACT

Kansas City Accepts Terms of Minneapolis Steel Company and Work Begins.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., April 7 .- Just of minute before the expiration today of the time limit within which the Gillette Herzog Manufacturing company had agreed soon leave for Chamberlain, S. D., where to accept a contract for the reconstruction of the Kansas City convention hall the accentance of the committee on building was received by telephone. This means that the steel work will be completed by June 15 nder a sufficient guaranty. Manager F J. Llewellyn spent the greater part of the night in telephonic conversation with the Kansas City chairman. At 4 a. m. he retired, believing that Kansas City would not accept the company's proposition. He had set 10 a. m. today as the limit for acceptance. The Carnegie Steel company at Pittsburg is already turning out the rolled iron, which will be shipped here for fabrication. The local company sends one of its best men to Pittsburg tonight with lists and until it is all shipped.

Mr. Llewellyn will reach Kansas City Mr. Gareissen will be at his studio, 215-216 Monday morning to complete the details of the contract. 


