COMMERCIAL AND FINANCIAL Markets Are Quiet-Wheat and Oats Show Some Activity. MARKET IS OUET BUT FIRM Liquidation of May is Feature in Oats Market-Provisions Are Quiet, the Main Demand Being for Lard -Hogs Are Easier. CHICAGO, April 27.-There was a change of sentiment to the bull view today and the news was encouraging to that way of looking at the wheat situation. Wheat closed 140% higher, corn 140% to 140% and oats unchanged to hale lower. Provisions closed 24c to 100124c improved. Trade in all the pits was rather quiet, with pots of activity in wheat and corn. The wheat market opened 1/2% over esterday because of higher cables from Liverpool and the Argentine shipments. which showed a decrease of over 1,000,000 bushels last week. There was a shifting of sentiment apparent early and it grew as the session progressed. The talent has been earish for months and very much disposed to hearken to Liverpool.
