His body was covered with bed bug bites. Thirty bugs were collected and were found to contain the bacillus tuberculosis, the cause of consumption. A Russian observer Pr. 

produced relapsing fever in monkeys by injecting spirochetae into them, found in the blood of hed bugs which had been in the

beds of the fever patients. "Moran isolated cages of healthy white mice. He then introduced into these cages some bed bugs from the cages of cancerous mice and after a few months he found that

mice and after a few months he found that all the mice infected by these bugs were suffering from cancer. This experimental evidence he considers as proving not only the contagion of cancer, but that it may be propagated by insects in which the contagion 4.00 may be present.
