WEST DES MOINES LEADS ALL

STRONG MAN RECLINS DOES THE TRICK

West Des Moines won the championship cup at the annual field meet of the Iowa State High School Athletic association held yesterday at the Union driving park. Rollins, a member of the winning team, captured the individual championship with three lifts. The track while rather heavy after the recent rains, was in better condition than had been expected, but despite this drawback some good time was made and several of the records made last year at Marquette were beaten.
