The details are kept most secret, but it can safely be stated that the Orange River colony and the Transvaal will become crown colonies. Sir Alfred Milner, it is declared, is to be high commissioner of South Africa spite of the opposition he has incurred. The Crown colony form of government can be best understood by reference to the system in vogue in the West Indies. Sierra Leone and Ceylon.
