NEW YORK, June 16 .- With a fine track under him and a clear sky above, Kinley Mack, with McCue up, took the \$10,000 Suburban handicap away from the great Ethelbert today at Sheepshead Bay by a length and a half. Ethelbert was punished hard all the way through the stretch, but to no better avail than second place, while Gulden ran in third and Imp and Jean Beraud

trailed home in the ruck. There was a crowd at the track, even at the start of the first race. The sky was gray, but at no time was there fear of rain


