Victor in Brooklyn Handicap Gives Sheepshead Big Surprises.

One-Hearted Ethelbert Makes Grand Finish, Coming Like Whirlwind in Stretch, but is Beaten Under the Wire.

NEW YORK, June 16.—With a fine track under him and a clear sky above, Kinley Mack, with McCue up, took the \$10,000 Suburban handicap away from the great Ethelbert today at Sheepshead by a length and a half. Ethelbert was punished hard all the way through the stretch, but to no better avail than second place, while Golden ran in third and Imp and Jean Beraud trailed home in the rack.

There was a crowd at the track, even at the start of the first race. The sky was gray, but at no time was there fear of rain. The track was good.

The horses paraded before the grandstand to the post as soon as 9 o'clock and were promptly lined up in front of the barn ready to start. Two false breaks were made in the first ten minutes, but about five minutes later the starter caught the horses all in a good line and sent them away together. They thundered down the stretch and in a first time, with Imp in the lead, Jean Beraud had second place, Kinley next, third, and Ethelbert fourth, but dropping back and not seeming to care for the position he had drawn against the rail.

Around the lower turn they rushed. Before they had completed the turn Jean Beraud poked his head in front of Imp and they were running as a pair a length in front of Kinley Mack, who was in turn a length to the better of Golden. The great Ethelbert was slowly dropping back, as Imp took fourth position. Inch by inch, foot by foot, Jean Beraud slowly slipped away from the others, and when half a mile had been made the pride of the Whitney string had a length the best of it in 4:15 and it surprised the crowd to see the fleet Ethelbert way back in the rack. Next to Jean Beraud came the grand mare Imp, with only a head the advantage over Kinley Mack, the Brooklyn handicap winner, who was hanging on like grim death in spite of the fact that everybody thought he could run only in the mud. Golden was still in fourth place and the others close up. Maher still laid back, while it took thirteen seconds to run the next furlong and all but Ethelbert were beginning to draw nearer to the leader.

Jean Beraud's margin began to get smaller and smaller as horse and jockeys were straining every nerve to get closer to the leader and striving to poke their noses to the front. They whirled past the five-furlong post as if they were in for a four-mile race and a short mile and a quarter. Thirteen seconds more and the sixth furlong pole was reached in 1:15, with Jean Beraud a neck in front of Imp and Imp but a neck to Ethelbert, who was half a length ahead of Golden.

Ethelbert still loped along three lengths back, although the time was three seconds slower than that made in the match race with Jean Beraud only a short while ago.

Imp Begins to Falter. Around the upper turn they charged, no change being made in the race. Thirteen seconds more time was noted before the seven furlongs pole was passed. Imp was faltering. So was Jean Beraud. McCue then came sailing up alongside with Kinley Mack. Turner noticed it, dug his heels into the quivering flanks of Jean Beraud and the gallant son of His Highness responded to the best of his ability. He did nobly for a few seconds and then again began to fall back. He soon joined Imp, who also had about enough of the race.
