The injunction suit to restrain the Board of Education from erecting a High school in excess of \$150,000, cost price, was submitted vesterday, following a rather dramatic appeal for the board by Attorney Carl Herring. Judge Keysor remarked that he appreciated the need of baste in deciding the case and would announce his opinion early next week. He added that inasmuch as the board members were known to have the best interests of the community at heart he would not wish to say without due time for consideration that they had exceeded the In the concluding speech Mr. Herring

frankly admitted that it was the board's in-

tention to exceed the \$150,000 limit fixed

as the maximum in the bond issue. "The present Board of Education," said Mr. Herring, "is made up of men who have sacrificed their business interests to serve the city's welfare, and they have done it heroically. If the board is a set of knaves and imbeciles. God help the taxpayers who put them there; the people have put these men in office and they must trust them. "On my advice as official attorney the board has entered upon the construction of a building which I believe will cost \$163,398, exclusive of architect's fees. I have advised the board that it has the power to spend \$25,000 annually in increasing school facilitles in accordance with a charter provision. The taxpayers have voluntarily separated themselves from this sum and have left entirely at the discretion of the board what shall be done with it. I hold, therefore, that it is no concern of the people, and, say it with all respect, it is no business of
