The weekly statistics of railroad traffic from Chicago show an increase in the grain traffic of western lines for the week of 30 per cent over last week, reaching the best figures for the corresponding week in five years, with the exception of last year. The deliveries at primary points ran up 9.4 per cent over last year, showing the attraction of present prives for the real holders of wheat. This demonstration detracted somewhat from the alarmist reports of wholesale disaster to the crops and additional attention was given to the hopes of the corn cree.

It was evident, however, that the buying of railroad stocks came largely from the short interest, which was willing to take profits at a decline in prices, but which was not pressed to take losses at the advance.
