The opening festivities began with a handlcap tourney in the afternoon, thirtyfive golfers appearing on the greens. The acores, as given in the sporting columns, reflected unlimited credit on the patience and skill of the participants. Many of the players were veterans who had known and loved the game in days gone by and others were tasting for the first time the sweets and bitters of the fascinating sport.

When the players came in, exhausted but triumphant, or downcast, as the case may be, they encountered a host of fair women, under whose conduct was the reception of the afternoon from 4 to 6. 
