SIOUX FALLS, S. D., July 11.-(Special.) -Lewis A. Larson, postmaster at Spink, Ution county, appeared before Judge Carland, of the United States court, and pleaded guilty to the charge of making false returns to the auditor of the Postoffice department in Washington for the purpose of fradulently increasing his compensation as post-master. He was fined the sum of \$50, which he paid. By reason of the false returns to the Postoffice department Larson received an aggregate of \$340.78 more than he otherwise would as commissions on the business transacted by his office. He has refunded this sum to the government.
