

HAD ANOTHER GOOD DAY

American Athletes Made Fine Record for Themselves at Paris Exposition Contests.

PARIS, July 16.—Twenty-one champion-ship contests in connection with the expo-sition have been decided during the last three days and America can boast of win-ning sixteen and of securing thirteen sec-onds and twelve thirds. Nine events took place today. The Amer-icans captured the 200 meters hurdle race, the standing high jump, three standing jumps, the long jump, the op, step and jump, the hammer throwing and the stand-ing long jump and they did it easily. In fact the facility with which the American athletes carried off prizes finally grew monotonous. Three events were won by foreigners.

monotonous. Three events were won by foreigners. One, the tug-of-war, was not contested by the Americans. In the 800 metres flat race, which was won by an Englishman. Tysoe, the Americans took second nad third places. In the remaining race the 4,000 meters steeplechase they failed to get a place. Englishmen taking all three. The race for place was vigorously contested, however, Pritchard again beating Tewksbury, who finished third. Time: 0:25:2-5. Choisel, a French-man, also ran in this event. Rau, a Ger-man: Moloney of Chicago university and Remington of Pennsylvania were among those who ran in the first trial heats. Tansin, a Frenchman: Levis of Syracuse, and T. B. McClain of the University of Pennsylvania, contested in the second trial heat. There were only four starters in the first heat. The three standing jumps were easily won by the Americans, the athletes from the United States quickly outjumping all the other competitors. The same can be said of the hop, step and jump which followed. Prinstein of Syra-cuse university, Connolly of Boston and Richard Sheldon of the New York Athletic club qualified for the finals and iumped. Prinstein won, though Connelly pushed him hard. The same entries competed in those two jumping contests, there being besides those mentioned Jarvis of Pennsylvania, Horton of Princeton university, John Mc-Clain of the University of Michigan, Staff. Swede: Steffen, Germany, and Koppan, Greece.
