

## Storm Severe in Dakota.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., July 17 .- (Special.) -The rain which began falling last Friday continued almost steadily until yesterday, giving the state one of the best drenchings it has had for several years. J. F. Hickey who returned from a trip to the northern portion of the state, visiting Watertown, Redfield, Milbank, Aberdeen and other points, states that everywhere he went they

were having heavy rains. Railroad men say that the rains have been general over their lines in all directions. In this vicinity the downpour has been unprecedented for July, usually a comparatively dry month. For he month of July, 1898, the total rainfall in this locality was 3.08 inches; for July, 1809. it was 2.87. So far this month the preinitation, as measured at the government building, has been 6.57 inches, of which amount 4.22 inches has fallen since last Friday evening.

### Dakota Well Watered.

HURON, S. D., July 17 .- (Special.)-Yesterday the rainfall in this part of the state for the month of July is almost six inches the heaviest known for the same month in many years. The ground is full of water

and sloughs and low places contain water for stock almost without limit. If no more rain occurs for the next four weeks crops will not suffer, wheat harvest will be, out of the way and hay will be abundant. From midnight Saturday to noon Sunday the rainfall was almost two inches.




