CONFIDENCE IN AMERICA

United States Ambassador to Russia Speaks of This Country's Position in World's Eye.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Mr. Charlemagne Tower, United States ambassador to Russia, arrived in Washington today and went directly to the State department to pay his respects to Secretary Hay.

This leave was applied for four months ago, so that his return at this time cannot be connected with the Chinese situation. Mr. Tower declares that, judging from the feeling he saw at St. Petersburg, and in the other great European cities through which he passed on his way home, the United States is in a peculiarly favored position.

"As far as the report of war between Russia and China is concerned," said Mr. Tower, in reply to a question, "I think it is totally unwarranted. What I have understood is that the Russian government has declared a state of siege, which is equivalent, under its procedure, merely to a military government for the purpose of restoring order. It is not a declaration of war in any sense."

AMERICAN GOODS IN SIBERIA

Russian Merchants Feeling the Pressure of Skilled Yankee Competition.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—"We are now building a railway into China, but the chances are that the Americans will benefit more than the Russians," says a leading newspaper of Russia in an article recently published.

"During the time that we are quarreling about the tariff and the abolition of the free port of Vladivostok," it continues, "the world has taken possession of the Siberian markets."

Consular Agent Harris says that this is double exaggerated, but that it is useless to deny that foreign capital and enterprise have found a profitable field in Siberia.

OFFICIALS CONFER ON CUBA

Fix on Time for Holding Election to Formulate Independent Government.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—It is understood that the president and General Wood have agreed on September 15 as the time for holding the election in Cuba for delegates to the constitutional convention that is to be called for the purpose of formulating a constitution for an independent government.
