Wheat Rallies and Closes Firm After Touching Bottom.

MARKET GENERALLY SHOWS DECLINE

Fine Weather and Liverpool Cables Make Corn Wenk-Oats and Provisions Duit Under Lack of Demand.

CHICAGO, July 25.-Big shipping, sale and a reduction in the estimated French yield came to the aid of the previously weak wheat market and September of Light over yesterday. Corn closed 'so lower and cats be down. At the close the

provision market showed 245715c decline. September wheat started out table over the previous close at Talgatishe, scalpers buying on a half-hearted hope of a raily following the recent heavy decline. Their hopes were blasted in short order, however, for there was no support at that time. Cables were weak, weather in the north Cables were weak, weather in the north-west favorable for harvesting and outside people apparently did not know there was such a thing as a wheat market in this city. The market naturally began to decline and as it went down stop-loss orders were caught and the liquidation this induced helped the slump along. Liverpool said that Argentine wheat was being offered cheap and that the talent expected liberal arrivals from Russia. Not till September bumped up against 74%c, the bottom of the present decline, did the market receive much support. Soon after the cash part of the market began to attract attention cash people had sold between 500,000 and 700,000 bushels, most of it hard Kansas. and were covering in the pit. Shorts were further joited by a cable announcing a reduction in the estimate of the French cropfrom 30,000,000 bushels. Trade became active and September falled steadily to 75%c and closed soon after in a firm condition. September (4,4%c over yesterday at 754,47%dc. New York reported 21 loads taken for export and of the cash sales here 300,000 bushels were reported sold direct to the other side. Seaboard clear-snees in wheat and flour were equal to 102,600 bushels. Primary receipts aggregated 78,000 bushels, compared with 790,000 bushels last year. Minneapolis and Dulath reported 251 cars, against 181 last week and 3% a year ago. Local receipts numbered 180 cars, 34 of contract grade.

Fine growing weather over the largest area ever planted, giving promise of a bumper crop, caused a further decline in corn, although weak Liverpool cables were also an influence in this direction. Liquidation was renewed early and the price fell off over a cent. There was still a good cash demand, but the smallness of country offerings made it hard to find sellers and this, together with the reaction in wheat caused a partial recovery later. Trade was quiet. September sold between 354,62%c, closing 4cc under yesterday at 37%c. Recipts were 298 cars.
