WEATHER CAUSES LIQUIDATION IN CORN

Oats Markets Again Inder a Depressing influence, but Later Rally-Provisions Are Dull Early, but Afterward Show Activity.

CHICAGO, Aug. 23 -- Wheat was weak early today in the face of buildsh news, but railled later on export demand, September closing %2%c higher. Corn and outs each closed 148%c lower. Provisions closed

closed withe lower. Provisions closed slightly improved.

September wheat opened a shade ap, at 131,473%. Liverpool showed a \$22,4 d advance; heavy rains in the northwest were reported as interfering with harvesting and traders generally expected a falling off in primary receipts in the hear future. In the face of this the opening figures were a disappointment. The cause of this unresponsive attitude of the market was to be found in selling by outside people through commission houses. In disguel local traders sold the outside lead and September dropped early to 734c. Later the presence of an expert demand began to be felt. This started the market upward and early sellers turned buyers, but found offerings very scarce. September railied sharply to 54% and closed strong. \$200 km also here were reported at 185,000 bushels, while New York claimed seventy loads taken for export. Clearances at the seabouth in wheat and flour were equal to 175,000 bushels. Russia reported depressing returns from some quarters, and the tye crop as below the average. Primary receipts were 1,040,000 bushels, compared with 640,000 cushicis last year. Minneapoils and Diffinit reported 377 cars, against 242 last week and 251 a year ago. Local receipts numbered 255 cars, fifteen of contract grades. Advices from the spring wheat territory were to the effect that the rains had done serious damage to wheat in shook. The domestic flour trade was said to be in a flourishing condition. slightly improved.

The market opened a shade higher, but siumped steadily following the first trades. Later the wheat strength acted as a support and most of the loss was regained, the close being steady. Outs were again under the depressing influence of September liquidation. Improved crop reports from some sections, coupled with the early weakness of corn were the factors.
