DEWEY ARCH IN SAU CONDITION.

Sample Instance of New York Patrictism and Parstmony Scaked by the rain, shaken by the wind, with its big, symbolical figures streaked with grime and in a condition altogether unlovely, the naval arch, formerly known as the liewey arch, presents a sorry spectoric as the gateway to Madison square,

To judge from the comments of New Yorkers, says the Herald, they are heartily fired of the structure that has fallen into such a dilapidated state. It no longer impresses out of town visitors as a thing f beauty, and even the officers of the citizens' committee for perpetuating the arch say that the present structure had better be removed, as it is a base libel on their project. Although the municipal council appropriated \$2,000 for keeping the arch in repairs, the patches of fresh plaster and coats of whitewash industriously laid on the columns and piers only serve 12.806.61 to emphasize the process of disintegration to which the copy of the famous arch of Titus has fallen a victim.

Colonel Church, chairman of the citizens' committee for perpetuating the naval arch,

s.ocs.50 said today "The arch is certainly in a wretched condition and its removal would do our 9,500.00 cause no harm. Indeed, speaking from the standpoint of one of those interessed in pereptuating the arch, the present structure serves no purpose and is a libel

on our project. "We have at present raised about \$200,oce, which is only one-third of the sum required to perpetuate the arch. Very little is being done just now to raise funds.
