Enrollment Shows Considerable Increase

The number of pupils in the Omaha public schools for the week just ended is 1,412; in excess of the enrollment during the first week of school in 1897. An attendance report made by the principals Friday evening shows that the enrollment for the week! was 15,607. The enrollments for the corresponding week of the three previous years were as follows: 1897, 14,125, 1898, 15,068;

Although the attendance is greater at all buildings than it was last year, the increase 18 more marked at the Lake school and the High school than elsewhere. Extraseats have been provided in many of the schools and in some cases the crowded confers to other buildings.

There are about 100 more pupils at the High school than attended the first week of last year. Many of these entered the new commercial course which has been instituted, the enrollment of beginners in that department being 112. 




