Wheat Keeps Dull and Weak Gait During All the Session.

CORN IS WITHOUT LIFE OUT OF SYMPATHY

Nothing is Doing in the Oats Pit—Provisions Enjoyed a Fairly Good Speculative Trade Without Changing Much in Price.

OMAHA WHOLESALE MARKETS.

Condition of Trade and Quotations on Staple and Fancy Produce.

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—An estimate of a heavy exportable surplus for Argentine wheat was largely responsible for a weak wheat market today, October closing 14@14c lower. Corn closed 4¢ down and oats a shade higher. Provisions closed but little changed.

Wheat started dull and weak and kept at that gait all day. The chief bearish factor was the Bremhill estimate that the Argentine would have an exportable surplus of 92,000,000 bushels. On the other hand north-west receipts were light, Argentine shipments only 34,000 bushels, compared with 62,000 bushels the previous week, and New York receipts were 1,000 bushels less. The crowd was in the selling mood, however, and bulls' news was tossed into the waste basket, while the price bumped down the speculative stairs. October opened 4¢ lower at from 73@74 to 73@75, touched 73@76 soon after, and the under pressure of Argentine exports closed 4¢ lower. Prices for oats and some of it on stop-loss orders, dropped to 70@71c, at which week figure the market was again quiet. Demand fair and prices strong. Receipts 5 cars.
