

SCHUMACHER'S NEW POSITION

Made General Agent of Union Pacific at San Francisco.

CONSOLIDATION OF AGENCIES GOES ON

Separate Offices for Freight and Passenger Departments Will Be Thing of the Past After November 1.

T. M. Schumacher, vice president and general manager of the California Fruit Express, with headquarters in Los Angeles, Cal., has resigned his position to accept a more responsible position with the Union Pacific.

The acceptance of the general agency at San Francisco by Mr. Schumacher is considered a proof positive that the only real consolidation of the Union Pacific which now maintain separate freight and passenger agencies are to follow the precedent already established in the consolidation of the two departments under the jurisdiction of the freight department.

A number of changes will be made at the time of consolidating the freight and passenger departments at Kansas City and San Francisco. At present, the freight department has already been taken at all of the general agencies of the Union Pacific except in the cases of the San Francisco and Kansas City offices.

It is understood that these two agencies would follow the precedent established in time and November 1 is now supposed to be the date fixed for making the change.
