

CONDITION OF OMAHA'S TRADE

Long Ome and Warm Weather Injuring Business Considerably.

MARKETS FIRM, GENERALLY UNCHANGED

Jobbers Counting on a Big Trade as Soon as More Favorable Conditions Put in Their Appearance.

The volume of traffic last week did not show any signs as well as during the early part of October, the long continued warm weather has presented retailers from all over as more winter goods as they should have been. Jobbers are counting on their stocks as still quite complete. They naturally do not press orders for more stocks until they have used up some and consequently jobbers' stock lines have been doing a very creditable business. The rains helped out the demand for winter weather goods to some extent, but did not help to move winter clothing. What is needed is cold weather and with that comes an appearance that there will be much more favorable conditions.

Another factor in the year's approach of winter trade is the near approach of election. While politics has not interfered with the trade as much as is generally the case during a presidential campaign, and jobbers have felt the effect of the election for they have felt the effect of the few days of severe cold. This impression seems to be that with deteriorating weather after election trade will be entirely satisfied.

There were some important changes in the market since last report. The feeling seems to be from all along the line that everything must come to some time to come and some lines may even go higher.

GROCERS Active and Busy.

There has been a quiet active market for the last week, warm weather for the last three days especially causing those who are engaged with a year line they are now doing more business, but they look for a continuation of the same. The market as a whole is in a good healthy condition, but there has been no special feature since last report.

The market is very quiet, but it is predicted that there will be a big increase in the visible supply when the new year comes. Jobbers are now asking for more and packers are giving them what they want. Receipts are 4 cars, GATES, No. 2 white, \$6c.
