

CONGRESS IS ONE-SIDED

Republicans Have Majority Over All of Forty-Seven Votes.

EVEN LARGER CLAIMS MADE AS TO SIZE

Chairman Richardson of the Democratic Committee Concedes Defeat, but Refuses to Go Into Figures.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—At 10 o'clock tonight Congressman Joseph W. Babcock, chairman of the republican national committee, issued the following statement:

The democrats have elected solid congressional delegations in the following states, viz: Alabama; Arkansas; Colorado; Florida; Georgia; Louisiana; Mississippi; Missouri; Nevada; North Carolina; Texas and Virginia, aggregating seventy-five members.

The republicans have elected solid congressional delegations in the following states, viz: California; Connecticut; Delaware; Iowa; Maine; Maryland; Michigan; Minnesota; New Hampshire; North Dakota; Oregon; Rhode Island; South Dakota; Utah; Vermont; Washington; West Virginia; Wisconsin and Wyoming, aggregating ninety members.

The republicans have elected twelve members in Illinois, the democrats ten; Lorimer and Roderberg, republicans, having been defeated. In Indiana we elect nine and the democrats four, the representation remaining the same as now. In Kentucky the republicans elect two, in the Fifth and Eleventh districts, and the democrats six, with the Third, Ninth and Tenth in doubt. Massachusetts, republicans, ten; democrats, three (no change). Missouri, republicans two, democrats twelve, with fourteenth district in doubt. Nebraska, republicans two, democrats one, with the Third, Fourth and Fifth districts in doubt. New Jersey, republicans six, democrats two, same as now. New York, republicans twenty-two, democrats twelve. We gain the First, Fourth, Fourteenth, Sixteenth and Twentieth districts in New York. South Carolina, republicans two, in the Eighth and Ninth districts, democrats seven. Ohio, republicans seventeen, democrats four. We gain the Third, the Dayton district, by 200, and the Twelfth, Columbus, the district of Congressman Lentz, by 14. Pennsylvania, republicans twenty-six, democrats three, with the Twenty-eighth district in doubt. We gain the Third, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-seventh districts in Pennsylvania. Tennessee, republicans two, democrats eight, same as now. Total republicans, 222; democrats, 147; doubtful, 8.

The present congress as elected contains 385 republicans; opposition, 172. Congressman William Lorimer of the Second district in New Jersey, who was elected before six republicans and two democrats. NEW MEXICO—Indications are B. S. Rodey (rep.) is elected delegate to congress. Santa Fe county gave Rodey 2000 majority. Bernalillo county, 1,200; Otero county, 15. The legislature is republican.

NORTH CAROLINA—The republicans have carried by good majorities two of the nine congressional districts in this state and a third one is very close, but believed to be democratic. Blackburn (rep.) is elected in the Eighth and Moody (rep.) in the Ninth districts. In the Fifth, Kitchen (dem.) is re-elected by a small majority. Bryan's majority in the state will be between 25,000 and 30,000.

OHIO—Complete unofficial returns give Leavelle (dem.) 11 over Tompkins (rep.) in the Twelfth congressional district. Owing to the close vote the official count will be made tomorrow.

Twenty-third District—Jacob A. Beldier (rep.) elected. More complete returns leave only the Third and Twelfth congressional districts as doubtful in Ohio. In the nineteen undisputed districts the democrats and republicans have carried the same districts as in the last congress, sixteen to three. The chairman of the Twelfth district was then democratic. At noon today the state democratic chairman had nothing to say. Republican Chairman Dick said: "The returns at noon today from seventy of the eighty counties in Ohio show the plurality of McKinley will approximate 80,000. We have elected Nevin in the Third, Tompkins in the Twelfth and Beldier in the Twentieth district, insuring seventeen republican members of congress out of 21."

Latest returns from the Third congressional district indicate the election of R. M. Nevin (rep.) by 119 votes.

OKLAHOMA TERRITORY—Territorial election returns are coming in slowly, but enough is known to show that Dennis T. Flynn, republican, is re-elected delegate to congress over Robert A. Neff by a majority of not less than 3,000. The republicans claim six members of the council and the election of E. Duffy, anti-fusion populist #1, in the Fifth district, who is expected to vote with the republicans. This would give the republicans a minimum majority. The lower house is claimed by the republicans by 16.

MISSISSIPPI—The next delegation to congress from this state will be wholly democratic. The state is conceded to Bryan by 45,000.

PENNSYLVANIA—Pennsylvania's next delegation in the house of representatives will stand: Republicans, 28; democrats, 4; a republican gain of six. The four republican members are: Eighth, Howard Mutchler; Ninth, Henry D. Green; Seventeenth, Rufus K. Polk; Twenty-eighth, J. K. H. Hall. The last three were re-elected. Among the democrats to go down to defeat is Congressman William McAleer, in the Fifth district of Philadelphia. Henry Burk, republican, a morocco manufacturer, who defeated him, had 1,260 majority. McAleer claims that the election was a farce and that the mayor of Philadelphia sent 15,000 police into the district to intimidate voters.

Republican State Chairman Reeder claims that Quay will have 151 votes on joint ballot in the next legislature for re-election to the United States senate. There are 215 votes on joint ballot and 128 are necessary to elect. The state senate may be a tie on the question of Quay and anti-Quay. Returns from the senatorial and legislative districts of Pennsylvania indicate that M. S. Quay will have not less than 145 votes on joint ballot for United States senator, seventeen more than the necessary number to elect. Of the 204 members of the house the democrats have elected less than fifty, as against seventy-one straight-out democrats two years ago. The anti-Quay republicans will probably not muster over fifty votes of the 206 on joint ballot.

Pennsylvania's delegation in the next congress, according to the latest returns, will stand: republicans twenty-six, democrats four, a republican gain of six. In the twenty-eight district of Congressman J. K. P. Hall, democrat, is re-elected by an apparent plurality of 82, but friends of A. A. Clearwater, republican, claim a victory for him and the official count will be required to decide who won.

SOUTH CAROLINA—Every democratic congressman was elected.

TENNESSEE—The democrats have elected eight and the republicans two congressmen. The legislature will be largely democratic. Complete returns indicate the election of Hon. J. A. Moore (dem.) to congress from the Third district, by a small majority.

WEST VIRGINIA—Third district, Holt Gaines (dem.) elected.

Bryan is uncommunicative.

LINCOLN, Nov. 7.—With the exception of a short drive in the early evening Wil-

liam Jennings Bryan remained in his study during the day, rising late this morning and retiring early tonight. He said this evening that he had no statement of any kind to make. Mr. Bryan received hundreds of telegrams during the day and evening from personal and political friends, but their nature was not disclosed.

It is Mr. Bryan's intention to remain in Lincoln at least until he is thoroughly rested. To newspaper correspondents he asked to be excused from outlining his future action.

MORTON AND HIS NEW PARTY
Sage of Arbor Lodge Suggests the Phoenix to Rise from Ashes of the Democracy.

NEBRASKA CITY, Neb., Nov. 7.—(Special Telegram.)—Hon. J. Sterling Morton was interviewed tonight upon the subject of the reorganization of the democratic party along new lines. Mr. Morton said: "If the democratic party ever acquires the confidence of the American people again it must be after its renunciation of all the many fallacies which the populist, Colonel Bryan, advocates. After such confession of its heresies it must also hold itself a respecter and willing servant of the law as administered and interpreted by the constitutionally established courts of the United States. Any party which advocates dishonest money must either die or accede to power after recantation of its errors and a long probation in opposition to maintain the honor and integrity of the national faith and credit. Perhaps, since the debauchery of democracy by Colonel Bryan has been so flagrant, a new party, made up of the best intelligent and patriotic of the people, might emerge from the rubble that the party managers name which since 1896 has meant only dishonesty, repudiation and antagonism to the constitutional administration of the laws. No party preaching fallacies in language, denouncing the writ of injunction and advocating the initiative and referendum ought to succeed in a representative government like this."

PROMISES WELL FOR PARISH
With Six Precincts to Hear from Republican is in the Lead for County Attorneyship.

The returns on the office of county attorney indicate that John Parish, republican, is elected by a small majority. With six precincts missing in ninety-nine, four of them in South Omaha, Mr. Parish has a lead of 282 and the party managers consider the probability small that Shields will be able to overcome this advantage in the precincts still to be heard from. NO CONCESSIONS TO G. A. R.

BRYAN'S FUTURE IS DOUBT
Fusionists Begin to Speculate as to What Shall Be Done with Him.

BURKETT'S MAJORITY IS GETTING BIGGER
Probability That the First District Has Given the Republican Candidate a Plurality of Almost 3,000.

LINCOLN, Nov. 7.—(Special.)—People in Lincoln have begun to speculate as to whether W. J. Bryan will continue to participate actively in political affairs. Some fusionists insist that if their party controls the state legislature, he should be elected as many men of the same political faith who assert unhesitatingly that he should keep out of the field for at least a few years. It has already been announced in this city by the friends of the Omaha fusion aspirant for senator that Mr. Bryan some time ago gave his word that he would not become a candidate.

"He has been defeated twice and the only square thing for him to do now is to step down and out," said a Douglas county democrat, who came down from Omaha this morning. "Bryan is a young man and he can afford to wait a few years. There are other men in Nebraska who are more deserving that Mr. Bryan and in fact they have been assured by him that he will not interfere with their plans."

Auditor Corral remarked that if the legislature is fusion Mr. Bryan and Senator Allen should be elected senators. He said, however, that Mr. Hitchcock would oppose the election of the former and that he had done more in the campaign than any other man to injure the fusion ticket in Nebraska.

From the returns received from ninety per cent of the precincts in the First congressional district it is estimated that Congressman Burkett's plurality will be between 2,800 and 2,900, which will be a gain of nearly 400 votes over his plurality of two years ago. Chairman T. H. Munger estimates that he will lead George W. Berge, the fusion nominee, by 2,885 votes.

For all missing precincts he has given the fusionists the benefit of the doubt and he thinks that the official figures may raise the plurality to 2,900 or over. Of the seven counties in the district Congressman Burkett received a plurality in all except Richardson.

The reports received at congressional headquarters do not contain the vote for electors or state candidates, but it is believed that Congressman Burkett ran a little ahead of the balance of the ticket. Even in republican ranks the vote cast for Mr. Burkett is a great surprise. The First district is normally republican, but majorities have never been so large as at this election. W. J. Bryan carried the district in 1892 by the narrow margin of 140 votes and republican majorities since then have averaged less than 1,500. Mr. Burkett received a plurality of 2,400 votes two years ago, which at that time was considered remarkably large. Chairman Munger estimates the pluralities in the various counties on congressman as follows:

Following is the lineup: Nineteen farm mortgages filed, worth \$23,251.47, same released, thirty-four, aggregating \$30,700.85; seventeen city mortgages were filed, \$15,300, and ten released, \$4,700. The chattel record shows eighty-two filed, \$27,251.19, and forty-three released, \$25,904.82. There were no deeds in foreclosure during the month.

Supreme Court Convenes.
