New Cuban Quarantine Law Shown by General Wood Not to Be in Nature of a Hardship.

HAVANA, Nev. 9 .- The government's regulations with respect to the quarantine of immigrants have provoked some objections on the part of the Havana press, neveral journals contending that there is a discrimination agaist Spaniards, The Spanish consul, apparently taking this view of the case, addressed a letter to General Wood, in the course of which he said in part as follows:

part as follows: I cannot see any advantage from a sani-tary point of view in quarantining third-class immigrants only. Almost all Spanish passengers are probably non-immune, and it seems to me that the new regulation will result in a decrease in immigration. I must admit, however, that I have visited the im-migrants now at Cabanas and that all ex-press themselves as satisfied with the treat-ment. ment


