Samuel Strong Arrives in Cripple Creek to Answer Serious Charges.

SUSPECTED OF BLOWING UP VICTOR SHAFT

Incident is Reminiscent of Days of Buil Hill War, When Cripple Creek Miners Were on Strike-Crime Was Sensational.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Nov. 14 .-Samuel Strong, a prominent Cripple Creek mining man, has arrived home from his to face the charges recently brought against him in connection with the destructive ex-

plosion which occurred at the Strong mine in Victor six years ago.

The Strong shaft house, ore house and machinery were blown up May 25, 1894. The explosion was one of the sensational incidents of the "Buil hill" war, when the miners of the Cripple Creek district were on strike and hundreds of deputy sheriffs were enlisted and armed in Denver to oppose the strikers.

Robert J. Lyons, Nicholas Kelly and several other miners were tried, convicted and sentenced to long terms in the penitentiary for the Strong mine affair. Their innocence

for the Strong mine affair. Their innocence has since been shown and they were pardoned. They have brought suit for \$150,-000 damages each against Mr. Strong. It is alleged in the complaints that Mr. Strong himself caused the explosion. It is charged that he had agreed to sell the property to E. W. Giddings and William Lennox, and that at the time of the explosion he had already received \$20,000 as part payment for the property and a balance of \$40,000 was due him in a few days. It is claimed that he discovered the value of the property after he had sold it and expected that after the that he had agreed to sell the propworkings were destroyed by the explosion they would fail to pay the balance due and the property would revert to him.


