Department of Agriculture Figures
Out Average for Crop of 1800.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The preliminary estimate of the average yield per acre in corn in 1900, as published in the forthcoming monthly report of the statistician of the Department of Agriculture, is 25.2 bushels, as compared with an average yield of 25.31 bushels in 1899, of 24.76 bushels in 1898 and a ten-year average of 24.1 bushels. The Indicated yield per acre in Onio is 37 bushels, in Indiana and Iowa, 38; in Hilmois, 37; in Missouri, 28; in Kansas, 19, and in Nebraska, 26. The average in quality is 85.5 per cent, as compared with 72.2 per cent last year and 82.7 per cent in November, 1898. It is estimated that 4.4 per cent of the corn crop of 1899 was still in the hands of farmers on November 1, 1890, as compared with 5.9 per cent of the crop of 1898 in farmers' no November 1, 1898, and 7.25 per cent of that of 1857 in hand on November 1, 1898.
