TAKE OUNCE OF PREVENTION

Health Officials Use Every Precaution Against Smallpox.
SERIOUS EPIDEMIC SEEMED TO IMPEND. Period of Contagion Expires Without Further Cases Being Developed—Disease Appears in Light Form.
The prevalence of smallpox in surrounding districts has aroused the concern of the city health department and every precaution is being taken to prevent the ingress of the disease. A number of isolated patients have been cared for and in all cases the neighborhoods are now adjudged safe through the prompt action of the officials. The principal danger existed last week ago and the period of contagion has now expired.
On November 14 J. Henry was taken with the disease in an apartment house at 1823 Leavenworth street. Many people who lived in the house had been exposed and the commission was afraid that other cases would develop. Mrs. Henry waited on her husband for several days before the case was diagnosed. She was put under quarantine.
The house was thoroughly fumigated, all the persons who had been exposed were vaccinated and every precaution was taken to prevent the communication of the disease. The time for infection has passed and no additional cases have developed.
Henry is supposed to have contracted the disease from the Omaha camp. He had been dangerously sick since taken to the emergency hospital.
J. J. Mullen has been sick with smallpox at 2203 Burdette street for more than a week. All of his family is quarantined and the house is being disinfected. The disease has been dangerously sick since taken to the emergency hospital.
George Bauer and J. Robbins, who are housed in the emergency hospital, were taken to the hospital from their homes on the railroad. Both of the men realized that they had the disease and turned themselves over to the health authorities before exposing any Omahans to the disease unnecessarily. All of his family is quarantined and very light cases of smallpox. The disease has been kept so well in check that the health authorities feel confident that there will be no epidemic if people will take steps to fortify themselves against it.
"Good people," said Dr. Victor H. Coffman, "It has been shown beyond the shadow of a doubt that vaccinations in childhood do not always make people immune to the disease. It is better to be on the safe side and every person in Omaha should have enough regard for public health to take this precaution."
