The case has been assigned a place on the call, but if left in its present position it might be held over until the next day. The action is one in which the attorpey general seeks to recover approximately \$600,000 as penalties for violation of the maximum freight rate law. The case of the State ex rel Douglas county against Frank, involving the constitutionality of the law affecting and limiting the compensation of the clerks of the district court, will come up for rehearing toward the close of the sitting. Judges Norval and Sullivan arrived this afternoon and with Judge Holcomb began the preliminary work of the sitting. The court will listen to arguments tomorrow and Wednesday.



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Local Forecast Official. Record for November. November, 1990, made a record for good behavior. There were no extremes. For instance, the mean atmospheric pressure was 30.4 inches, with a maximum of 20.51 inches on the 15th and a minimum of 20.72 inches on the 22d, a maximum spread of .79 inches during seven days. The highest temperature was 72 on the 3d, and the lowest was 12 on the 21st. The greatest daily range of temperature was 26 degrees on the 13th, when the maximum was 50 and the minimum was 24, with a trace of rain-fall. On the 19th the temperature was the nearcest equal, the daily range being but 6 degrees, from a top of 33 to a bottom of 27. The mean temperature for the month was 37, which is exactly the mean temperature of the month for thirty years. During the month there was a total wind movement of 5.962 miles, the prevailing direction being from the north, and the maximum velocity being thirty-three miles an hour from the northwest on the 13th. Fifteen one-hun-dredits of an inch of precipitation is re-corded for the month, a deficiency of .87 inches. There were eleven clear days, seven partly cloudy days and twelve cloudy days. Six days showed a trace of precipitation, four showed oil inches or more. The total snowfail for the month was 1.3 inches. Record for November. 
