








## RUNS A RACE WITH FATE

Cattle Magnate Journeys on Special Train to Sick Daughter's Bedside.

REMARKABLY FAST TIME IS SCORED

Paul McCormick Covers Datance Between Omaha and Billings

in Eighteen Hours and

One Minute.

Exercised to distraction by the news that his daughter was lying dangerously near death's door, Paul McCormick, a wealthy Montana cattleman, chartered a special Burlington train and made a recordbreaking journey from Omaha to his daugh-

ter's bedside at Billings, Mont. Mr. and Mrs. McCormick reached Omaha from the east Thursday morning. They had been absent from home for several weeks and in their travels had failed to receive frequent letters written them by their daughters at Billings. Failure to do so kept them in ignorance of the sudden ill-ness of Miss Madeline McCormick and the first knowledge of the daughter's precarious condition reached Mr. McCormick yesterday

about noon. His Cmaha agent had been wired from Billings, instructing him to inform Mr. Mc-Cormick Immediately upon his arrival here of the daughter's sickness, but the agent missed Mr. McCormick and located him

only after several hours' diligent search among the leading hotels. The information that their daughter had been seriously ill came as a thunderbolt from a clear sky to both Mr. and Mrs. Me-Cormick and was especially the more distressing because they knew not how long the daughter had been sick nor how serious her condition. As a consequence no delay in reaching Billings was to be considered and negotiations were immediately entered into for a special train. At 1:47 hour earlier than closing time shown below.
