

His Custody of South On the application of Allen R. Kelly's attorneys, Judge Baxter has issued a writ of babeas corpus commanding Sheriff Power to bring Kelly before him at 5 o'clock this morning for a hearing to show cause why he should not be released from the custody of the sheriff. Kelly was bound over to the district court by Judge Vinsonbaler on the charge of bribery. Bail was placed at \$1,000, but Kelly furnished no surety. Instead, his attorneys made a demand on the court that he be released without ball, for the reason that there is no law under which a mayor of a city can be tried

The application for a writ of habeas corpus is based on the same contention as that advanced at the time of the request for Kelly's release without bail. In spite of Judge Vinsonhaler's ruling the attorneys insist that Kelly cannot be held in lieu of bail. Judge Baxter will settle the point In the meantime Kelly is supposed to be in the custody of the sheriff, but as a matter of fact he has his liberty. A good many people have found grounds to criticise the sheriff for placing Kelly under no restraint at all, because he happens to be the mayor of South Omaha. They assert that he ought
