

The matter stood for a month with no de velopments, but on the night mentioned the fence was taken away and the complainant in the present proceedings has filed affida-vits to the effect that the Ritter boys have made boasts that they destroyed the fence at their father's bidding. Half a hundred neighbors of the contestants were in the court room during the hearing, many of them being there to testify. At the outset witnesses declared that they had seen a wagon and team belonging to the Ritters leaving the locality of the fence on the night in question. No additional details were brought out at yesterday's session of court.

### Cathers' Fence Will Stay.

The old controversy between the city and John T. Cathers over the famous Cathers fence on property at Twentleth and Locust streets has been settled by a decree of the district court confirming Cathers in the ownership of the property. For a good many years the city has contended that across the Cathers property there is a strip which is not included with the rest, but is for the use of the city as a street. On a number of occasions Cathers has built a fence barring the road along the strip in controversy and employes of the city, act- dress E 4, Bee. ing under the advice and instruction of the city legal advisers, have torn it down. Several personal encounters resulted from the guarrel and the courts have been called upon on more than one occasion to determine which set of disputants were in the right. The decree by Judge Fawcett puts an end to the quarrel, as it specifies that the city has been in the wrong in interfering with the fence. A perpetual restraining order forbids the fence being meddled with in the future.




