

BURNAM APPOINTMENT VOID

Court Denies Authority of County Board to Appoint Deputy Attorney.

EXCEPT UPON PETITION OF TAXPAYERS

Judge Dickinson Holds that County Attorney Shields is Entitled to the Assistance of Only Three Deputies.

Judge Dickinson holds that County Attorney George W. Shields went outside the provisions of the law when he secured the appointment of a fourth assistant county attorney by the Board of County Commissioners.

No decree in the case will be entered until the court determines upon the petition of Mr. Gussolus, although the temporary order restraining the payment of salaries to both men remains in force.

Opinion of the Court.

The court's opinion in substance is as follows:

It appears from the petition and from the evidence introduced in this case that George W. Shields was duly elected as the county attorney for Douglas county, and that thereafter Shields duly qualified and gave the bond required by law and entered upon the discharge of his duties as county attorney, and that thereafter, and in pursuance to section 20, chapter VII, of the Compiled Statutes of Nebraska, the said Shields appointed as deputy attorneys Ignatius Danahy, Josie I. Abbott and Elmer E. Thomas, and that said parties accepted said appointments and offices and gave the bonds required by law and entered upon the discharge of their duties.

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MEETS IN SPECIAL SESSION

City Council Considers Ordinance for Payment of Deficits.

FINANCE COMMITTEE MAKES A REPORT

It is Recommended that Several Bills Be Stricken from the Ordinance—Objection to Legal Department Claims.

A special meeting of the city council was called for 10:30 yesterday morning. Long after that hour only three councilmen had arrived and a call of the house was made. Officers rounded up the missing members and shortly before noon the meeting was called to order.

The meeting was for consideration of the ordinance introduced at the last council meeting for the payment of all bills and deficits, amounting to \$182,000. Chairman Mount of the committee on finance and claims made a report, in which he recommended that several bills be stricken from the ordinance. The two most important items advised against were the salaries of Charles E. Morgan, Jack Norton and Miss Anna Neelander, who were recently employed to assist the legal department in the collection of delinquent special taxes, and a balance of \$1,250 due on the pneumatic street cleaner purchased last year.

Record of Employment. It was contended in the committee report that the three new employees in the legal department were hired without any record being made of their employment. The objection to the balance on the street cleaner was that the company was to keep the machine in repair for a year and has failed to do so.

Mr. Mount was the only member of the finance and claims committee who signed the report. By unanimous vote the report was adopted, but when the ordinance was put on its passage it was defeated by a vote of 5 to 4. Councilmen Burkley, Haecall, Hoye, Whitehorn and Zimman opposed the measure and the affirmative votes were cast by Councilmen Lobeck, Mount, Trolier and Karr.

Various reasons were given for the defeat of the ordinance. Objections to certain items in the ordinance led some of the opponents of the measure to vote in the negative. Several of the members stated that they want the ordinance to be re-drafted and are willing to support it after all the items have been gone over carefully.
