Republicans in Senate Adopt the Bills Decided On in Caucus.

LINES ARE SHIFTED TO SOME EXTENT

Second Congressional Gets Cass In-Stead of Washington - Douglas County's Representation in Legislature is Increased.

LINCOLN, March 25 .- (Special.) -- The senate today, after many attempts, succeeded in having brought up for consideration the reapportionment bills. The first considered was Senator Young's congressional reapportionment bill, which was discussed for half an hour, after which the republican members went into caucus and agreed on the three reapportionment bills in the following shape, all of them being recommended for passage. The congressional bill divides the state as follows:



MERGER IS YET TO BE MADE

Illinois Central to Close with Minneapolis & St. Louis and lows Central.

NEW YORK, March 25.-The Mail and Express says: "It is stated today on authority that a deal for the acquisition of the Minneapolis & St. Louis and lowa Central by the Ilinois Central will shortly be Negotiations have been pending for some time.

"The Hinois Central offered to guarantee 4 per cent on the common stock of the Minneapolis & St. Louis, while the owners of the latter held out for 5, claiming that the company is now earning upward of on the common. The plan is for the Minneapolis & St. Louis first to absorb the Iowa Central, with an exchange of Minneapolis & St. Louis stock for lowa Central stock on an agreed basis.

"There will be no trouble about the merger of the two smaller railroads, for both of them are controlled by the same group of capitalists. The acquisition of these two roads would give the Illnois Central an entrance into St. Paul and Minneapolis and also give it better control of lowa and southers Minnesota territor

"The Minneapolis & St. Louis has \$6,000, 000 of common and \$4,000,000 of cent preferred. The lows Central has \$8 .-512,000 of common and \$5,670,000 5 cent preferred.
