

CALLAHAN BECOMES BALKY

Stands Mute When Asked to Plead in Criminal Court.

JUDGE BAKER ENTERS PLEA FOR HIM

Court Overrules Two Motions to Nullify Complaint and Sets Beginning of Trial for April 23.

James Callahan was arraigned again yesterday. This time he was brought before Judge Baker to plead to the latest complaint filed against him by the county attorney, the complaint which charges that Pat Crowe, John Doe and James Callahan committed the crime of robbery by stealing \$25,000 from Edward A. Cudahy by putting him in fear, etc.

Callahan's lawyers demurred to the complaint on three grounds. First, because the alleged facts stated do not constitute an offense punishable by the laws of Nebraska; second, because the information states no facts, but merely conclusions; third, because the information was filed by the duly qualified and elected county attorney of Douglas county.

Demurrer is Overruled. Judge Baker promptly overruled the demurrer and then the attorneys moved to quash the information because there are three other suits pending against Callahan for the same offense and none of them have been tried or disposed of. The court also overruled this motion.

Callahan was asked if he was guilty or not guilty, but he refused to plead, his attorneys having advised him to stand mute. "The law which provides the right of a prisoner to stand mute," said the court, "was intended for idiots and others who are physically unable to plead. In such cases the court has the right to enter the plea of not guilty for the prisoner and that is what will be done in this case."

Judge Baker set April 23 as the date for beginning the trial of Callahan.

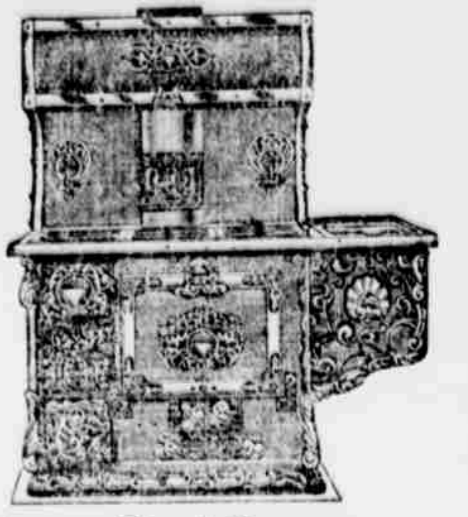
