



The shirt waist made on simple sever lines and the skirt trimmed with frills make two marked features of the season and are in great demand for simple costumes. The stylish model shown combines the two and is essentially smart, as well as entirely correct. The original is made from mercerized madras, in white with stripes of violet, and is worn with a tie and belt of black satin and a simple sailor hat of rough straw, but all the many cheviots, madras, ginghams, dimities, linen and cotton, ducks and similar materials are equally suitable.

The waist is cut after the latest method and brings about just that arrangement of stripes which means the most becoming lines. The back is smooth across the shoulders, with the fullness drawn down in gathers at the waist line. The fronts are gathered at the neck and again at the waist. The sleeves, in regulation hirt waist style, have the modified bishop shaping, and the new narrow stiff cuffs slightly rounded at the corners and closed with link buttons. The neck is completed with a comfortable neck band, to which is attached the standing collar, shaped at the corners to match the cuffs.

The skirt is cut in five gores and fits snugly at the upper portion, while it flares freely at the feet. The side gores are fitted by means of short hip darts and the fullness at the back is arranged in a succession of narrow tucks which are generally becoming, but, when preferred, the back gores can be gathered and allowed to hang from the belt. The trimming consists of frills of the material trimmed and headed by bands of embroidered insertion and edged with narrow embroidered, frills. To cut this gown for a woman of medium size 11% vards of material 27 inches wide. or 91/2 yards 32 inches wide, will be required, with 13 yards of edging and 16 yards of insertion to trim as illustrated. To cut the waist alone 3% yards of material 21 inches wide, 3% yards 27 inches wide, 25% yards 32 inches, or 1% yards 48

inches wide, will be required; to cut the skirt alone 814 yards 21 or 27 inches wide with frills, 6% yards without; 7% yards 32 inches wide with frills, 6 yards without, or 4% yards, 44 inches with frills, 3% yards without. 
